## Sorry Day at La Trobe Uni 2013

## Let's Talk Recognition.

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is celebrated across Australia each year between 27 May and 3 June. This week includes two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey

- The anniversaries of the successful 1967 referendum and
- The High Court Mabo decision.

The theme for this year's NTW was Let's Talk Recognition.

Within Reconciliation Week, National Sorry Day is born out of a key recommendation made by the National Inquiry into the Separation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children from their families in the *Bringing them home* Report that was tabled in Federal Parliament on 26 May 1997:

7a. That the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Commission, in consultation with the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation, arrange for a national `Sorry Day' to be celebrated each year to commemorate the history of forcible removals and its effects.

Held annually on 26 May since 1998, Sorry Day commemorates and remembers of all those who have been impacted by the government policies of the forcible removal of babies and children

from their families, now known as the Stolen Generations of Australia.

In 1992, Prime Minister Paul Keating made a speech in Redfern, which acknowledged for the first time that 'we took the children from their mothers'.


La Trobe University holds an event annually to commemorate National Sorry Day.

This year Aunty Joy Wandin Murphy held a poignant welcome to country, followed by an interesting dissertation by Jane Harrison. Professor Mark Rose and vice chancellor John Dewar also spoke of the impact of colonisation and the intergenerational trauma of the Stolen Generations.

Some four hundred people attended the event.
